C1 DIALOGUE & INTERACTION - WRITING & SPEAKING GUIDE

Please note that the following information **should be used as a guide**. This guide will help you plan and respond to everyday **formal** and **informal** written and spoken interactional situations, for example: dialogues, role play, conversations and meetings.

However, you have to make your own decisions about what to say and write based on the specific situation, the people you are interacting with, as well as your interests, your strengths, and any weaknesses. Furthermore, you can make sentences and phrases easier or more complex depending on your knowledge, confidence and fluency. Finally, it is a good idea to choose a few structures and phrases from each section of the bank of language functions and structures table, and practise those for different situations. You should not try to learn everything. You need to be adaptable.

The most important thing to remember is that you must have a very clear idea about the specific evaluation and assessment criteria, and make your own independent decisions based on this knowledge.

This guide connects the Escuela Oficial de Idiomas' evaluation criteria to a wide variety of different sentences and phrases.

It's great to see you again. <i>I'm over the moon</i> today <i>because</i> (+ idea) - Hi, what a <i>coincidence</i> to <i>bump into</i> you. I was just thinking about you <i>because</i> (+ introduce the topic) - Good morning darling, how's your hangover? FORMAL greeting (where appropriate): - Good afternoon and welcome to our monthly association meeting. We are here to discuss the <i>recent criminal activity</i> in our neighbourhood, and to <i>negotiate potential measures in order to prevent and reduce</i> this problem. - Good morning, <u>I'm afraid</u> I would like to <u>complain about</u> (+ reason/topic) <u>OPENING LINES: Introduce the topic:</u> Well, remember last week I was telling you that I was planning a <i>getaway</i> / trip to celebrate my anniversary. Well, I've been thinking about it a lot and I think we should go camping because it's <i>as cheap as chips</i>. So, remember last week we were talking about me taking up a new outdoor activity. Well, I've been thinking about it a lot, and it seems to me that we should do yoga because it is good for the body and the mind. Anyway, remember we have been talking about <i>redesigning</i> our flat, well, I've thought about a few ideas. (+1 idea) I think we should buy <i>second-hand furniture because</i> it is <i>cheaper</i>.
